The United States has criticised Azerbaijan's new electoral law as seriously flawed.

The State Department spokesman, Philip Reeker, said that although the new legislation was an improvement on earlier drafts, it did not remove a restriction which prevented political parties registered in the last six months from contesting elections scheduled for November.

In addition, he said that changes to the law on the make-up of the General Election Commission allowed the body to sit legally without any members of the opposition being present, and could prevent the election from being transparent and vote-counting from being impartial. Both moves have already been strongly criticised by the Organisation for Security and Co-operation in Europe. Mr Reeker said that the United States hoped the problems could be corrected.
